Caballero is the Executive Director of AAPCHO, an organization dedicated to promoting advocacy, collaboration, and leadership that improves the health status and access of Asian Americans (AAs), Native Hawaiians (NHs) and Pacific Islanders (PIs). AAPCHO envisions a world in which AAs, NHs, PIs, and all communities have equitable access to affordable, high quality, and culturally and linguistically proficient health care. As Executive Director, Jeff oversees AAPCHO's overall strategic direction and execution of its mission and vision. Jeff has been with AAPCHO since 1993. In this role, he advocates for programs and policies that increase access to high-quality, comprehensive health care services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate; and reduce health inequities. Jeff is currently founding Co-Chair of Hep B United, founding Co-Chair of TB Elimination Alliance Steering Committee, Advocacy Committee member of the American Diabetes Association, founding member of the Protecting Immigrant Families Coalition, and founding member of the TB United community engagement network. Jeff received his bachelor's degree in Biochemistry/Cell Biology from the University of California, San Diego, and his Masters in Public Health from the University of California, Los Angeles.

Juliet K. Choi, JD She/Her President and Chief Executive Officer Asian Pacific Islander American Health Forum (APIAHF)



Dr. Juliet K. Choi is the President and Chief Executive Officer of APIAHF, a national health justice organization which influences policy, mobilizes communities, and strengthens programs and organizations to improve the health of Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders.

She is an accomplished cross-sector leader and coalition builder who specializes in change management, system reform and stakeholder relations, particularly in the areas of immigration, civil rights, healthcare and disaster relief.

A senior executive, she served in the Obama administration as the former chief of staff and senior advisor of two federal agencies: U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) at the U.S. Department of Homeland Security; and the Office for Civil Rights (OCR) at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Prior to her political appointments, she led disaster relief operations and strategic partnerships at the American Red Cross as a member of the disaster leadership team.



She has previously worked at the Partnership for Public Service, Asian American Justice Center, Mental Health America, and a Fortune 500 corporation. Juliet received her law school's Alumni Association Award for Leadership and Character and Rising Star Alumnus Award. The proud daughter of South Korean immigrants, she is humbled to serve on the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Commission on Data Modernization, and on the boards of the NAPABA Law Foundation and national YWCA USA. A certified mediator, Juliet received her J.D. from University of Maryland School of Law and clerked for the Hon. Dennis M. Sweeney (ret.) of the Circuit Court for Howard County, Maryland. She received her B.A. in Economics from University of Virginia.

Nashia Choudhury, MPH She/Her Director of Programs, Health Care Transformation AAPCHO



Nashia co-directs and oversees AAPCHO's Programs and Services, supports training and technical assistance, disaggregated data advocacy, workforce development, and health center partnerships. She oversees the Community Health Worker Workforce Collaborative, National Training and Technical Assistance Partnerships, and partnerships focused on enabling services, data collection and social needs interventions.

Prior to joining AAPCHO, Nashia served as the Data and Evaluation Manager at the National Association of Community Health Workers; Director of Operations at MyCare Health Center in Michigan; and Associate Director of Operations and Enabling Services at the Michigan Primary Care Association. Chari Cohen, DrPH, MPH She/Her President Hepatitis B Foundation



Dr. Chari Cohen is President of the Hepatitis B Foundation. For the past 22 years, she has planned, implemented and evaluated community programs and research projects focusing on reducing health disparities and improving health outcomes associated with hepatitis B and liver cancer. Dr. Cohen is co-chair of the national Hep B United coalition, co-founder and chair of Hep B United Philadelphia, co-founder and chair of CHIPO: Coalition Against Hepatitis for People of African Origin; co-chair of the Hep Free PA coalition; and chair of the Sidney Kimmel Cancer Center Community Advisory Board. She is a member of the ICE-HBV steering committee, the HepVu advisory committee, and is a member of the HBV Forum for Collaborative Research and the Patient Advocacy Group of the American Association for the Study of Liver Diseases (AASLD). Dr. Cohen is Professor at the Baruch S. Blumberg Institute, and adjunct faculty for Geisinger Commonwealth School of Medicine.



Jacqueline (Jackie) Cuen She/Her TB Survivor and Advocate We Are TB / Somos TB



Jackie Cuen is a TB Survivor and Advocate from the San Diego, CA/Tijuana, Mexico border area. She was diagnosed with drug-susceptible, active pulmonary TB in February 2019. Later that year, she started actively working with other public health professionals and organizations dedicated to eradicating TB. As a Somos TB Support member, she has been helping lead peer support meetings in Spanish for those undergoing TB treatment, former TB patients, as well as their caretakers.

Mukta Deia (Deia) She/Her Program Coordinator of Infectious Diseases AAPCHO



Mukta Deia is the Program Coordinator of Infectious Diseases at AAPCHO. In this role, Deia is principally responsible for providing assistance in coordinating programs related to maintaining and strengthening current tuberculosis (TB) control, COVID-19, and Hepatitis B priorities. She also serves as TEA and AAPCHO's representative on both the TB Roundtable and Stop TB USA Media Workgroup, and NTCA/Union-NAR 2024 National TB Conference Abstract Planning Committee.

Before joining AAPCHO, Deia served as COVID-19 Response Program Manager at the American College of Medical Toxicology, where she oversaw the assessment of the COVID-19 Response Task Force and the delivery of dynamic activities to meet their needs.

Dr. Nick DeLuca is the Chief of the CEBSB at the CDC Division of TB Elimination. Dr. DeLuca previously served as the Associate Director for Communication Science in the Center for Global Health (CGH). There, he led a variety of important actions, including the development and implementation of many new communication products, extensive updates to web-based and social media materials, delivery of emergency and risk communication training to countries throughout the world, and media relations with a variety of domestic and international media outlets.


From 2012-2016, Dr. DeLuca served as the Chief of the Prevention Communication Branch in the Division of HIV/AIDS Prevention. In that role, he oversaw science-based HIV communications programs and campaigns promoting HIV awareness, testing, prevention, and services for the public, persons at risk for and living with HIV, as well as for healthcare professionals treating and caring for persons with HIV. From 2008-2011, Dr. DeLuca was the Prevention Advisor with CDC's Global AIDS Program in Namibia, where he managed HIV and TB prevention, communications, education, and intervention programs.

Dr. DeLuca began his CDC career in CEBSB in 1997, and he became Team Lead for the Education, Training, and Behavioral Studies Team in 2002. As team lead, he oversaw a variety of behavioral science research activities and developed numerous TB-related education, training, and communication products. He is an author on several scientific publications from



his work in DTBE. Dr. DeLuca received his PhD in Health Education and Health Promotion from the University of Alabama at Birmingham.

Alan Doan He/Him Program Manager Asian Pacific Health Foundation (APHF)



Alan Doan serves as a Program Manager for APHF, a non-profit, community-based organization that provides free clinical screening and education services to the underserved communities throughout San Diego in order to better health outcomes. With the support of TEA's TB Mini-grant, project leads, Alan Doan and Brianna Dzyuba, have integrated tuberculosis education and prevention into APHF's central mission, while working to mitigate TB transmission and to encourage TB screening. 
Adama Dyoniziak, MPH She/Her Executive Director Champions for Health (CHF)



Adama Dyoniziak is the Executive Director of CHF. Since 2018, Adama has overseen CFH's staff, operations, and board committees. She has over 25 years of experience in strategic planning, fiscal management, revenue development, program development, implementation and evaluation, and organizational management. She has previously worked at the Braille Institute, Long Beach Department of Health & Human Services, Watts Health Foundation, and was a lecturer for 20 years at CSU Long Beach. She holds an MPH from San Diego State University School of Public Health.



Lusiana (Lucy) Hansen She/Her Founder and Chief Executive Officer Polynesian Association of Alaska (PAOA)



Lucy Hansen is the Founder and Chief Executive Officer of the PAOA, a nonprofit organization with the mission to support individuals, improve families by promoting education, and instill cultural pride in youth. She also started a Polynesian Culture Saturday School in partnership with the Anchorage School District teaching Samoan and Tongan Language and Culture in Anchorage. She also served as a board member of Bridge Builders of Anchorage from 2018 to 2019 and was honored as the Vice President of Bridge Builders of Anchorage.

In 2005, Lucy hosted the first Polynesian Culture Flag Day in Alaska and became the first Polynesian (Samoa) woman to raise the American Samoa, Independent Samoa, and their Sister Island of Tonga National Flags in the soil of Anchorage Alaska. In recognition of her advocacy for the Polynesian community, she was honored with a Chief Samoan Title Name, Muaimalae Tuga Hansen, from the Atoali'i organization in Hawaii and California. She also earned many other awards, including the Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) Women "Champions of Change" Award from the White House, the "Women of Achievement Award" from the YWCA of Alaska, the Presidential Award from Bridge Builders of Anchorage 2021, and Community Heart Award 2022 through Anchorage Community Land Trust. Lusiana is a true Pacific Island Leader for her people and her community.

Frank Hood currently serves as Director of Hep B United and the Associate Director of Policy and Partnerships at the Hepatitis B Foundation. In these roles he works to connect the voices of advocates and those living with hep B to policymakers at the federal level to improve access to screening, treatment, and vaccination for the disease. 
Robin Lewy, MA She/Her Co-Founder and Director Rural Women's Health Project (RWHP)



Robin Lewy is Co-Founder and Director of RWHP,, the only health justice organization in North Florida. Robin has worked for 35 years in social justice, health education and community mobilization in the United States and Central America. In her role, she oversees advocacy and direct service programming that serves Latinx immigrants, farmworkers and rural communities. Robin is a regional trainer on health inequity in rural communities, Promotor de Salud programming and the use of testimonial media. She is the Community Liaison for the Gainesville Immigrant Neighbor Inclusion Initiative, which has brought together 60 members into a Steering Committee to develop a Blueprint for immigrant integration in the city and county. She holds a MA in Social Development and Popular Theatre, University of Nebraska-Omaha.



Philip LoBue, MD, FACP, FCCP He/Him Director, Division of Tuberculosis Elimination National Center for HIV, Viral Hepatitis, STD, and TB Prevention (NCHHSTP), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention



Dr. Philip LoBue is the Director of the Division of Tuberculosis Elimination (DTBE) within the CDC's NCHHSTP.

Dr. LoBue received his undergraduate and medical degrees from the University of Pennsylvania. He received postgraduate training in Internal Medicine and Pulmonary and Critical Care Medicine at the University of California San Diego Medical Center where he was subsequently a Clinical Instructor and Assistant Clinical Professor of Medicine from 1995 to 1999. In 1999. Dr. LoBue joined DTBE as a medical epidemiologist assigned to the Tuberculosis Control Program in San Diego County, CA. Koa identifies as a Māhū wahine (trans woman) as well as a QTPI (Queer, Trans Pacific Islander) and has a strong affinity for community organizing, community-based participatory research (CBPR) research approaches, and Pacific Islander culturally-relevant public health intervention design. Throughout the pandemic, Koa has been a staunch advocate of Asian American/Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AA/NHPI) data disaggregation in COVID-19 surveillance data (i.e., cases and deaths) to be able to reveal COVID-19 health disparities among small populations like NHPI that are unfortunately hidden within aggregated AA/NHPI data. 
